**\*\*States or territories not listed have not been reviewed, you may submit an application for states not listed and the statutes and rules for that jurisdiction will be reviewed to determine if it meets the requirements.**

*489.511(5)(c), F.S. Has held a valid, current license to practice electrical or alarm system contracting issued by another state or territory of the United States for at least 10 years before the date of application and is applying for the same or similar license in this state, subject to ss. 489.510 and 489.521(3)(a) and subparagraph (1)(b)1. Such application must be made either when the license in another state or territory is active or within 2 years after such license was last active. Electrical contractors and alarm system contractors must complete a 2-hour course on the Florida Building Code. The required courses may be completed online.*

If your state of licensure is listed as not recognized for endorsement you can apply for licensure by first taking and passing the Florida examination.
